Dear Wally,

On a trip to the park the 15th, I dug out the information that you wrote for a month ago. Here are the answers to your questions:

- 1. Our records state that 15,000 German brown trout were planted in Crater Lake in 1914. I have found no other records so far so I make this statement: Apparently no brown or Loch Leven trout have been planted in the lake since 1910, the start of our records.
- 2. Following are plants in Crater Lake prior to 1932, according to our files:

No silversides have been planted since 1937. My records show no silversides planted in 1934. Otherwise your file is correct.

- 3. In 1923, 14,000 cut-throat trout were planted.
- 4. Attached is a copy of fishing regulations for Crater Lake National Park.

5. Fishing in 1950 was much restricted by the small number of boats available on the lake. Many anglers were inexperienced and poorly equipped which greatly affected their catch. Rainbow 5 inches to 27 inches in length were caught in 1950. Thousands of young fish 4 inches and under in schools were observed. The creel census is as follows:

Rollo S. Robinson who carried out fish investigations in 1950, and it is planned, will continue for the next three or four years, collected both Dolly Varden and rainbows from Sun Creek. His Dolly Vardens are Item 322 in the park zoological collection taken on August 5. They are still in his custody. Our records show that 646,685 rainbow and brook trout were planted in streams of Crater Lake within the ten-year period 1931 to 1940. Principal streams mentioned are Annie, Bybee, Bear, Copeland, Castle, Crater, Lost, Munson, National, Red Banket, Sand and Sun.

I will be glad to supply any other information I can dig up.
